But we always recommend that they also consider getting their memories stored on a computer file or open a DVA streaming account with us so when the DVDs stop working, the memories that were preserved don't have to be converted for a second (or sometimes third) time. digitally preserved is infinitely better that keeping them locked away on inaccessible analog media that will eventually corrode.
